

Celebrating Our Past and Planning Our Future

While researching photos for the slideshow presentation of our 65th Anniversary celebration we found some documents; we discovered important pieces of our story. For example, in 1966 our current building was dedicated. The years leading up to this involved raising money for the land and construction of the building. Once built, the Congregation also needed to furnish the building. The 1966 program has several pages dedicated to thanking those who contributed to the purchase of pews, altar linens, offering plates, candles, a piano, office furniture, hymnals, and the baptismal font. The list included a special thanks to the confirmation classes of 1963, 1964, and 1965 for their contributions. It's clear Prince of Peace has always been sustained by passionate and devoted members of our congregation.

When we look at the 20th, 40th, 50th, 60th and 65th Anniversary celebration services we can also see that our values have remained unchanged. The 1998 40th Anniversary program had a prayer that "the ministry of Prince of Peace will continue to grow in response to the changing needs of people in our community".

We have lived into that prayer in many ways throughout our history as demonstrated by the multiple community partners we have today, our ministries that serve those learning English and sign-language, are struggling with food insecurity, or seeking a welcoming place for spiritual growth. Our involvement in our community has been documented in many newspaper articles over the years reporting on the ways we have chosen to use our building and other resources for God's work. The articles include our decision to become a PADS site to provide shelter for the homeless, and our long-standing partnerships with Beth Tikvah and the Islamic Society of the Northwest Suburbs to host interfaith services and events showcasing these various faiths that all trace back to Abraham. One article told about the year the church staff pooled money usually spent on gifts for each other to buy winter coats for families impacted by AIDS. Others highlighted that our church was the starting point of a peaceful march down Higgins Road to build racial understanding.

We are celebrating our history this year, but the Congregation Council is also focused on our future. We are grateful to continue to have a Congregation passionate about serving and finding ways for us to Love God, Follow Jesus, and Invite All. We have formed a new committee to focus on Community Relationships and continue our outreach. We are continuing to educate ourselves about diversity, equity and inclusion issues. We also have a new Technology Committee to help us find the best path for incorporating technology into our ministries and support our office staff. We are finalizing our Annual Report and will be sharing more details about these and other important updates at the upcoming Congregation Annual Meeting on Sunday June 11, 2023 at 11:15 am. Pastor's Perspective

Prince of Peace has proudly been a Reconciling in Christ Congregation since 1997. This means that this congregation has adopted a statement of welcome and affirmation that specifically welcomes LGBTQIA+ individuals in our worship and community life, and that this congregation commits to a journey of anti-racism. In celebration of this commitment and understanding, we celebrate PRIDE month (each June). This celebration proclaims that the LGBTQIA+ community is wonderfully made in God's image and participation is invited here. You might wonder, though, *why* do we celebrate PRIDE month or *why* do we make a big deal of this in our congregation?

We make this statement as a witness to the truth and gospel of Christ, which reaches out to all people – but specifically cares for those who are marginalized or oppressed in society. Our Biblical understanding is that God has created each person exactly as we are, and God has called us 'good.' God created sexuality and our need for interdependence and called this 'good.' Anything that tears us away from healthy relationship to God, each other, creation, and ourselves is 'sin' or brokenness. God seeks to heal brokenness, as do we as followers of Jesus. So, when people are maliciously targeted in politics and communities and families and schools, we seek to be a safe place for healing and community, particularly for these hurting people.

We celebrate this understanding of the gospel LOUDLY, as in PRIDE month, because we believe our understanding provides a corrective to the wrong teaching that the LGBTQIA+ community is inherently sinful. We hope that other faith communities might hear this gospel of love and reconsider their teaching, so that all communities of faith might openly embrace and welcome all of God's children. In the meantime, we know that people have been hurt by the false teaching of these faith communities. Thus, we loudly proclaim that we are a safe and nurturing spiritual community for these of God's children to find healing. As one of many marginalized and targeted communities, the LGBTQIA+ community needs this safe spiritual space now more than ever.

We also make a point to celebrate PRIDE month – and lift up other specific groups of people in worship, education, and prayer – because our human nature naturally seeks out homeostasis (sameness) rather than diversity (difference). That means if we don't intentionally think about inviting or praying for people who are different from us, our natural tendency will be to think only about people who are like us – in whatever way our brains are used to thinking of those "like" us. Thus, we might *mean* to include people who are different from us. However, because of our biology, we won't think about people who are different from us - or the particular challenges they have that are different from ours - unless we make an effort to think about them.

We know that God's love reaches out to all people, and that love both reminds us of our sinfulness AND embraces us in mercy SO THAT we become freed to live differently. Thus, our biblical values and ethical and moral understandings call every person in our worshipping community to account. Each person becomes responsible to examine ourselves and our society in light of Jesus' love and care for the most vulnerable in society. This challenging work of being a follower of Jesus often leads to discomfort. When we embrace that discomfort and allow it to teach us, we become more fully the kind of Christian community into which Jesus calls us to be.

Celebrating PRIDE month helps us to live into our biblical values of providing a safe and nurturing place for God's children. For some, this may feel natural and exciting. For others, this may feel uncomfortable and confusing. For each, this celebration offers an invitation into a Christian community in which we know we are beloved and freed to be whom God has created us to be.





Anniversary Event—June 4th During Fellowship Time

The **Board of Serving Ministries** invites you to participate in our June anniversary event! We'll be celebrating this congregation's caring response to the needs of the residents in our community and the greater Chicago area. Most recently, welcoming new refugee families with furnishings for their apartments and food in their refrigerators and cupboards has brought out a higher level of generosity and commitment to "love our neighbors."

Take a walk around the hallways and you will find some special artwork. The Ministry of Hope Award from LSSI in 2005 recognized Prince of Peace for its exemplary ministries to the homeless, the hungry, English language learners, etc., in addition to children in LSSI's foster care program. The framed beaded cross was gifted to us by our missionaries, Dr. Steven, and Bethany Friberg, when they visited in 2018. It was handcrafted by the Maasai women in Tanzania.

Activities will include:

- --playing a Serving Ministries version of the Scattergories game, for all ages;
- --writing thank you notes to first responders, such as police officers, firefighters, and paramedics/EMTs—for all ages; note cards/paper will be provided;
- --writing letters to Congress advocating for legislation that is important to you. We will provide stationery for writing letters to our Senators, Dick Durbin and Tammy Duckworth, and your Representative--either Raja Krishnamoorthi, or the Rep for the district you live in.
- 1) We will have information on issues regarding food insecurity. The ELCA and other faith-based organizations, including Bread for the World, are encouraging advocacy in support of increased funding for and expansion of hunger alleviation programs such as SNAP benefits, which will be included in the 2023 Farm Bill. If you choose, you can use your cell phone and scan a QR code that links you to the Bread for the World website, which will enable you to send an electronic letter directly to your Congresspersons on hunger issues. There may be other online options.

2) We will have information on advocacy that is encouraged by the ELCA, Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service, and Viator House of Hospitality—to rebuild and restore a humane and just asylum system; to prioritize refugee resettlement; to vote NO on legislation that would end asylum. Deuteronomy 10:19

Imagine, you are vulnerable. You have had to flee for your life, for your safety. You have had to leave all that you know behind. Your job, your education, your community, maybe even your loved ones. All is gone. You have nothing familiar surrounding you.

Some of you participated in the "Fleeing For Your Life" simulation on May 6th, so you might have some idea of what that is like. In that simulation you imagined what it would be like to be in their situation.

There are 1440 minutes in every day and in every one of those minutes, over 20 people around the world are forced to leave everything that is familiar, to flee their homes, never to return. And after shifting from country to country, camp to camp, some of the fortunate refugees are able to finally end up here in the Chicagoland area. But, while these are the fortunate ones, they still have significant stumbling blocks to encounter. Firstly, they don't know anyone. They don't know anything about the culture. And, more than likely, they do not know the English language.

And now they are here. Against all the obstacles in their way, they need to start a new life. They need to learn a new language, a new culture, new customs and most of all, skills to find a job. Pretty hefty odds against someone who probably doesn't even know how to catch public transportation. They need friends to help them learn so many things.

On June 10th we will be hosting a cross cultural training session for our own congregation as well as other congregations in the area from 9:00-11:30 to learn **how you can participate** and what all is involved. There will be a registration on the Exodus World Service web page. https://exodusworldservice.org. It will be listed under events. Jody May from Exodus World Service will be facilitating the training. There are locations in Metro-Chicago as well as DuPage county for visiting our new neighbors.

A man asked Jesus what the most important commands were. Jesus answered, we are to love God and love our neighbor. When the man asked who is my neighbor, Jesus responded with a story of cross cultural compassion.


Although they come from far off countries, refugees are our neighbors.

PADS Update June 2023

Journeys has informed the PADS faith partners that Government and Cook County funding has ended for the hotel program as of May 1st. Around 100 homeless guests that have been housed in area hotels for the last 3 years are now out on their own seeking shelter. Since there are more guests than shelter beds available, a lottery system will be implemented. Journeys has opened their new building so they will be able to accommodate overnight guests soon and there will be a handful of churches continuing as summer PADS sites. Many thanks go out to all the Prince of Peace volunteers that have provided food for the homeless in area hotels since spring of 2020. Journeys will have a ribbon cutting ceremony for the new building open to the public on May 20th. It is a free event but interested people need to RSVP on the website at www.journeystheroadhome.org.
