
Shout with joy to the Lord, all the earth!

Psalm 100:1

As we head into August, I wonder what you're looking forward to this month. What expectation do you have about where you might find joy? I imagine that some expect continued warm summer days for swimming or hanging out in the backyard (or the air conditioning!). Others probably consider that children return to school this month with the promise of a new routine. Others may be planning a vacation or upcoming celebration. For others, this month might not hold something 'special,' but even then joy comes – perhaps in waking to sunny mornings or splashing in puddles during a downpour. In everything that happens, God gives us the opportunity to experience joy. The question is, do we expect joy – do we notice joy – do we shout for joy? This year's Vacation Bible School used Psalm 100:1 to remind campers that the joy we share shines the love of Jesus to others. This verse invites us to join others and all of creation to SHOUT for joy to the Lord. Shouting for joy does not have to depend on the circumstances around (or even within us). Rather than simply an emotion, joy arises out of the spiritual discipline of gratitude. Even in the midst of hardship and heartache, joy may bubble up, reminding us of God's love and care. When it does, the psalmist tells us – shout for joy!

We don't always have to shout about God's presence in our lives. We absolutely can praise God silently. We can quietly share a place we've noticed God's presence and the joy that presence brings. When we SHOUT, though, it does something to our bodies, emotions, and souls. We take up more space, we breathe more deeply, we may even feel the tingle of excitement as we share joy. With this sharing, others receive permission to experience and share joy, too. Others may experience God's love through our expression of joy. Our shouting for joy shines the love of Jesus into others' lives.

This month, I invite you to expect to experience joy. Seek joy, notice joy, and share joy with one another. No matter what other expectations you have, and no matter whether or not they come to fruition, expect to experience joy. Practice gratitude and hope in God's providence. Be courageous to share your joy as an expression of your faith. Join in, as we Shout for joy, all the earth!



Board of Stewardship

I need to start this month's Board of Stewardship article with a disclosure that the author of this article is approaching year 35 of a career as an Environmental Engineer because the topic this month is Environmental Stewardship. Genesis 1:26 (in the NIV translation) says: "Let us make mankind in our image, in our likeness, so that they may rule over the fish in the sea and the birds in the sky, over the livestock and all the wild animals, and over all the creatures that move along the ground." However, there is controversy over the translation of the Hebrew text to the English word "rule." Other translations use the word "dominion."

Since other texts in the Bible make it clear that God retains ownership over all of creation, I think it is a reasonable interpretation that this passage should be interpreted more as stewardship in the sense of caring for creation with rights to take from the fruit of creation to meet mankind's needs.

In doing my little bit of research for this article, I found this YouTube video: Biola University Environmental Stewardship lecture. Biola University is, as best as I could find, a conservative leaning Christian University with the goal of encouraging Biblical interpretation. The video is worth the 30 minutes to watch it if you want to hear a deeper look at environmental stewardship from a biblical perspective.

I'm going to skip ahead a bit now and get to the part where I presume you are convinced environmental stewardship is important and want to know what we should do. I'm going to skip the public policy issues and go to where I think the rubber meets the road, what we can do individually. While there are probably many books on the subject, I'm going to give a few practical tips:

- 1. The most environmentally friendly car trip is one you don't take. Whenever possible, meet your transportation needs by public transit, walking or bicycling (or a combination). When you do need to drive, combine your trips as much as possible.
- Cut down on your use of single use plastics as much as possible. While technically being
 recyclable, very little plastic gets recycled and the rest ends up in our landfills and water
 systems with the result that you probably eat a credit card's worth of plastic a week and the
 only way to effectively stop this is to not dispose of plastic.
- 3. Use less water, especially water that goes down the drain. It takes a tremendous amount of energy to prepare the water for human use and then treat it post use so even here in the Great Lakes area where availability is not a big issue, consumption still creates problems.
- 4. Make efforts to reduce your personal energy consumption such as around your home, especially during periods of peak demand (i.e. hot afternoons in the summer). Setting your thermostat a degree or two higher in the summer and lower in the winter helps as does adjusting the thermostat during periods when you aren't home.

Note that many of these changes are not only green in the sense of the environment but also in the sense of your wallet. For many years, my habit of meeting local transportation needs with a bicycle enabled our family to have one less car saving us over \$5,000 a year.

Music Notes...

"What Wondrous Love is this, O my Soul, that caused the Lord of bliss to bear the dreadful curse for my soul." from "What Wondrous Love is This" North American folk hymn, music by W. Walker

I just returned from my wondrous week in Philadelphia at the bi-annual conference of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians. The week was full of worthwhile, fulfilling, blessed and memorable experiences. I would like to share a few of them. Tina and I arrived in Philly on July 4th, the anniversary of one of its most historic days. Philadelphia has an interesting juxtaposition on this day, a national holiday, walking the city it was hard to find an open shop or restaurant, as most were closed for the 4th. We did find a pub where we had pasta, salad, and local beer on tap with the Phillies on the television. It left no doubt as to where we were. In contrast that evening, the city put on a huge party, with thousands gathering for a concert and fireworks just outside the steps that Rocky ran up in his first movie. In the interest of self-preservation, we watched fireworks from the comfort of our hotel TV and window. The full conference began on Wednesday. The conference theme was inspired by the hymn quoted above, What Wondrous Love is This. Days included morning prayer, a plenary session, a lunch gathering in addition to workshops, and evening services. The plenary session was given by Dr. Mark Miller, a professor of church music at Drew University and Yale University and minister of music at Christ Church (UCC) in Summit, NJ. He has also composed countless hymns and anthems. His focus was on the word "What" in the hymn title. Dr. Miller allowed his music to speak on how all of us are children of God. Miller was noticeably moved by a room full of Lutheran musicians singing his music. He shared impactful stories of his experiences being a child from parents of mixed-race backgrounds raised as an adopted son in a family led by a Methodist minister. He shared his story of coming out as gay to his adopted father in the early 1980's and of the unconditional love of his adopted parents. He told of the surprised reaction the congregation gave to his first time playing in a Black Baptist church having never been exposed to that culture's musical background. His music and his story were inspirational.

Daily workshops covered topics like Pastor-Cantor relationships, learning more about All Creation Sings, touring the famous organ at the former Wanamaker department store (now Macy's), and piano and organ repertoire sessions. Workshops included one on technology and worship and realizing what a wonderful job our tech team has done to be at the cutting edge of producing online our worship, another on new handbell repertoire where my bell choir would have been entertained watching their director ringing bells! It was comforting to find that our integration of musical worship styles is right in line with some of the most forward-looking Lutheran congregations. A highlight of any of these conferences is the worship experiences. I was able to experience worship at some of the most historically significant church buildings in Philadelphia including Christ Church near Independence Hall (constructed in the 1700's), Church of the Holy Trinity on Rittenhouse Square (credited as the first church to have O Little Town of Bethlehem performed), and St. Mark's Episcopal (gothic style architecture connected to a well-known Philadelphia architect). I got to lift my voice up at reading sessions of new choral music, attend a magnificent performance of Choral Arts Philadelphia (who performed recently discovered compositions from Giacomo Carissimi who dates from the 1600's), listen to an impromptu organ recital, and shop a room full of publisher vendors where I found new books for my library by wonderful Lutheran musician/authors Paul Westermeyer, Weston Noble and Carl Schalk. We also made time for socializing and walking around the city center of Philly. The other highlights were enjoying breakfast every morning with my dearest Tina, catching up with Doug Williams and Anne Organ, and having dinner with dear friends, Trisha and Steve, including watching their daughter play bass guitar in a performance of the musical *Tick*, *Tick*... *Boom*!

There is much to process from this trip and its influence will be felt in my worship planning for months to come as I include new music and new ideas into what we do at Prince of Peace. I believe the greatest gift from this trip was the sense of calm and peace I felt, the lack of rush and hustle that normally comes from daily life. The full schedule, yet slower pace of this trip was a refreshing change. Come ask me about it! This recap is the tip of the iceberg. I can tell you about the day Tina and I got soaked in the rain, about airline delays, and a jazzy morning worship if you want to hear about them! Soli Deo Gloria

Watching kids shine - a Steller VBS!

You know how you do something over and over again, it's very familiar and can become easy. It's only when your perspective of said action changes that the familiarity leaves you. I have done several sessions of Vacation Bible School over the years as a participant, junior crew leader and musical leader, and crew leader. This year I changed it up - I told Ms. Julia Schuetze that I would share my skills in any way she needed me to. So, I ran the video session a handful of times during the week, and my perspective of VBS was VERY new and took me a minute to adjust.

For those of you who have led VBS sessions, you know there is an element of improvisation involved. Mostly due to the variety of ages that attend VBS. Our three- and four-year-olds have a different experience than the 10-11 years old. There is what the script says, and then there is the practical expectation of what can be taught in just 20 minutes. It felt like doing a cold reading for an audition - you are handed words to say, and someone says go and you create a scene on the spot with as much ingenuity as possible in that moment. I do not know if VBS would be as successful without the help and moral support of my teen leaders (and all the kids who were in leadership positions).

Even though I stayed in the same role for most of the week, I enjoyed being able to connect with all of the crews throughout the week. Day 1 and 2 everyone was getting to know each other, day 3 and 4 is the peak of fun, and by day 5 everyone's a little bit sleepy but sad VBS is over. The participants this year jumped in feet first almost immediately. Everyone sang the songs and danced on the set up in the front, had insightful questions, and prayed loudly with all their hearts. It was such a joyful experience to watch everyone shine. In all of the ways that everyone experienced VBS, there was something special for everyone as we left at the end of the week.

I am so proud of Julia, by the way. Her confidence, preparation, knowledge of the program, organization, patience, and sense of chill were present in all the things. Part of my job is to encourage our youth to embrace leadership positions and support them in these endeavors. Julia Schuetze is a wonderful example of the kind of kid that Prince of Peace can send out into the world and do amazing things. It is up to all of us to continue that trend. And I know it's possible, because through Christ all things are possible.




The collection ends **August 6th.** Our donations will be picked up the week of August 7th, to allow enough time to distribute them to the children before school starts on August 21st.

There will be two sessions of four one-hour classes to attend. Classes are FREE! All are welcome!


