

The Story of Emil Pribula

Emil Pribula was born in Chicago on January 3, 1923. He was one of seven children and the only child born in a hospital.

His father, John, was ordained in 1914 after attending seminary at Carthage College. He had traveled from Slovakia to America first, via Ellis Island, followed by his wife Christine. Her family owned a vineyard in Slovakia where they most likely met while working in the vineyard. He pastored Lutheran churches in Indiana, Illinois, and Pennsylvania.

At 12 years of age, Emil worked on a garlic farm in Midlothian, IL (and ate garlic sandwiches for lunch). These were depression years, and he was trying to help support his family living in poverty. Emil graduated from high school in 1937. His first job was with Hills Bros. Coffee at the Merchandise Mart in Chicago, where he worked for 46 years.

Emil was drafted in 1943 and served in the Army Air Corp. He attended Honor Flight #27 out of Midway Airport in 2011.

Emil met his wife Pauline in 1946. Their first date was at "Orchestra Hall," attending a Rachmaninoff concert directed by Leonard Bernstein. Dinner followed at the Berghoff Restaurant. Always a gentleman! They were married for 63 years, raised four children, and grew as soul mates. Their passions together were family and church.

Emil's interests are many. Besides having been an accomplished golfer and bowler, Emil is a gifted artist. He received his artistic talent from his mother who used to draw frequently on the kitchen table (white enamel) & then erased it (the original dry erase board). His uncle was an artist too. Emil took art classes at Harper College and Fremd High School; he would paint watercolor from photos and places they traveled such as Door County and Yosemite.

Emil was confirmed at age 14 at the Slovak Lutheran Church and the first to be confirmed in English. While still in high school, he took two years of training to become a Sunday School teacher. Emil has been a member at Prince of Peace for over 58 years. Both Emil and his wife Pauline were highly active in service, leadership, and multiple ministries. It all began with a pastor from long ago who asked Emil, "How would you like to do something for your Lord?" The rest is history.

Emil participated in the Kingdom Weekend for many years. He served on the church council, attended the Tuesday morning Bible study, the men's weekly breakfast, served as a Stephen Minister, and taught adult Bible Studies. His favorite series was called Bethel Bible Study. Each lesson had a picture symbolizing the content for that lesson to help students remember the main points. One of the lessons was entitled "From Cradle to Crucifixion." The corresponding picture showed a light shining on Jesus's manger (cradle) and a beam of light then cast from the cradle to the cross beyond it. This image was very meaningful to Emil and a similar image appeared during a Christmas Eve program at Prince of Peace, as the production lighting on the manger angled up to the cross above it. God's plan was to come to this earth as an infant to be with us and to die for us, in order to save us from our sin.

Ten years ago, Emil traveled to Germany on a Martin Luther Reformation tour with Prince of Peace and Christus Victor Lutheran Church. Each night at dinner, Emil would lead our group in the doxology. Emil has always been a devoted worshiper, in person, and more recently, online. His faith is strong and steadfast, during adversity and joy.

Emil's favorite hymn is "Beautiful Savior" which he first heard at age twelve and later sung during the war. His favorite Bible verse is Psalm 121: 1-2: I lift up my eyes to the hills - from where will my help come? My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth."

Emil currently lives at Friendship Village and continues to stay active by listening to audio books, exercising, staying abreast of current events, and prayer/devotions. Always level-headed, self-disciplined, moderation, perseverance, adapting to change.

These cards are filling a vital need to support the children receiving services from LSSI. The first priority is giving each child a Christmas gift, including those who came into foster care after the wish lists were distributed. The second priority is meeting the urgent needs of foster families such as gift cards for food and winter gear. Additionally, basic needs support is given to intact families in which the children are receiving mental health services.

I have been tasked with mentioned/advertising said endeavor in my next Tidings article. Consider my task complete.

But of course, in the usual fashion of sitting down to write my monthly articles, my thought process has taken a different direction. For those of you who are teachers, you know that lesson planning is nothing but a plan - what actually happens all depends on what the kids do on that particular day. As the adult leaders had introduced the concept of service projects, refugees, and the vast day-to-day differences from a typical junior high school student's life in weeks prior, I had not yet seen the students jump in with both feet, brain power all in. That is, not until the first Wednesday evening we really started planning the who, what, when and where.

I had started off the evening with brainstorming what the Christmas party was going to look like - and although there weren't dancing sugar plums, the anticipated sugar high and spirit of the impending holidays was definitely alive in room 210. The same energy was maintained throughout the planning of this project. Using the post-it notes on the wall technique, every student posed questions, compromised on ideas, and offered to go beyond their comfort zone in the execution of their service project. It was absolutely awesome to experience this willingness and teamwork from this age group. (Parents of said students, you have some awesome children!)

Sitting back and thinking about it, the openness and courage of the humans that are 11-13 years old are exactly the vibes that everyone should aspire to include in their new year's resolutions. In the church, we reflect on rebirth and baptism at the beginning of a new calendar year. Every adult once had the same fantastic qualities the youth of our congregation demonstrate so easily, and could access the scarier qualities without thinking too hard about it. Let us pray for the Lord to let our children help the adults come full circle, and go back to a time where happiness, togetherness, joy, cooperation, and kindness were no-brainers.



Journeys has opened their new building for staff only at this point. Early next year the shelter portion will open which will increase the capacity to accommodate a growing need for emergency shelter in the northwest suburbs.
