Pastor's Perspective

Consider for a moment: what does the word *home* mean to you? Home might be a place, person, or a feeling. Maybe it is an experience of safety or belonging. Maybe home requires several of these things. You might find this question easy or obvious, or your answer might be something you imagine but has always eluded you. Regardless of how you understand home, a unique part of our Christian story is that it begins with Jesus Immanuel, whose name literally means God-with-us, running in fear as his family seeks a new home. Jesus is years into his youth before his family settles into a new place, called Nazareth, where they make their home.

Unfortunately, this story is all too familiar to millions of people around the world. Every minute of every day, at least 30 people begin fleeing the places they have always known as home¹. There are more than 27.1 million refugees in the world today, and less than 1% of them will be resettled in the next year. The average stay in a refugee camp is 17 years² – meaning some people flee their homes only to die in a refugee camp, and others live their entire childhood in a place few would recognize as 'home.'

In many ways, these stories mirror Jesus' story. They harken back to the holy family's flight to Egypt in fear for their lives. Many of us think "if Jesus' family looked to me for refuge, of course I would give it to them!" The refugee crisis in our own time gives us the opportunity to do just that – to welcome Jesus' family through welcoming siblings in Christ who also bear the image of the divine.

Throughout this year, we are celebrating how Prince of Peace has been a church home for 65 years. At the same time, we will learn and work together on extending this home to refugees like Jesus – people around the world desperately seeking a new home. This month, confirmation students are collecting items for a Welcome To America! Pack [see more information later in this issue of the Tidings]. Once collected, this pack will be given to a refugee family as they settle in the Chicagoland area, helping to transform an apartment into a home through goods, prayer, and love. As Lent begins on February 22nd, in this year's focus, we will hear different perspectives about the situation of refugees and invite each other into dialogue and action. Opportunities for learning, conversation, and action will continue throughout the rest of the year.

The Christian story tells us that Jesus knows intimately the fear, hunger, grief, and exhaustion of seeking a new home in a foreign land. As we consider this truth, may God open our hearts to refugees around the world, as learn, act, and pray together. May all people find home.

Celebrating our Cozy and Warm Gathering Place

Every December I am so grateful for holiday lights and advent candles that create a feeling of warmth and coziness as the sun disappears earlier each day. I recently found out from one of my long-time friends, who lives in Denmark, that the Danish have a word for this feeling "hygge" (pronounced hoo-guh). It is a little difficult to translate, but broadly means to create feelings of cozy warmth, joy, good cheer, and a sense of belonging. The Danes would use this to describe candlelight moments, cozy blankets, and sweaters, and having a warm cup of hot cocoa with a friend. I would use it to describe worship and gatherings at Prince of Peace.

Our 65th anniversary celebration events are some examples of how we have been creating hygge by sharing food, fellowship, and fun activities since 1958. Our anniversary has also surfaced some historical facts about the places we have gathered. According to a Daily Herald article about our 50th Anniversary, our original building on Illinois Avenue cost \$7,900 for 1.3 acres of land and \$50,000 to construct the building in the late 1950s. We relocated to our current location a few years later and the cornerstone was laid in 1965. Our Vision 2020 campaign raised funds to renovate this worship space and make our final mortgage payment on the building.

We are blessed that so many years ago the original church members prioritized building a place to gather where we can live out our mission to Love God, Follow Jesus, and Invite All. Over the years we endeavored to continue to be good stewards of their gift and share it with our extended Schaumburg and Hoffman Estates community. We appreciate all the support from our Congregation members and the work of our Board of Property members who help with this. Their efforts throughout the years have allowed us to provide food and shelter to those in need; offer preschool classes and sign language lessons, meeting space for community groups, and weekly worship for both our in-person and virtual communities.

As we gather and celebrate our 65th Anniversary throughout 2023, we are continuing to find new ways to make the best use of our space. We have hopes of being a place where our community can find joy as they celebrate weddings, discuss important community issues, learn new skills, play games, meet friends, get a warm cup of coffee on a cold morning and most of all feel they have found somewhere where they are always welcome because Prince of Peace is where they belong.

"This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased; listen to him!" - Matthew 17:5

Transfiguration Sunday has long been one of my favorite festival Sundays. It can be a little scary personally when it occurs in January, because it signals the beginning of Lent and the impending preparation for Easter. However, when it occurs in February, like this year, it allows for a little time to absorb its story and find its meaning. From the gospel of Matthew, the story tells of Jesus taking Peter, James, and John to a high mountain where Jesus becomes transformed; his clothes becoming a dazzling white. Peter says to Jesus, "Lord, it is good for us to be here." Then a voice from the clouds says the quote from the scripture above, "... with (Jesus) I am well pleased." I know I would have needed a change of shorts if I had been there. Then Jesus says, tell no one about this, which obviously Peter and James and John didn't do, because we know the story. So much is packed into this story, but the idea of not only Jesus, but Peter being changed is what I find significant. Our devotional *The Word in Season* says, this moment is a moment of clarity for Peter. Peter was called to follow and listen to Jesus. We too are called to love, follow, and serve Jesus.

There are so many lovely hymns that can be used on and around Transfiguration: ELW 315 How Good, Lord, to Be Here, ELW 671 Shine, Jesus, Shine, ELW 308 O Morning Star, How Fair and Bright, ELW 815 I Want to Walk as a Child of the Light, ELW 866 We Are Marching in the Light, ELW 834 Immortal Invisible, God Only Wise, and my most favorite ELW 838 Beautiful Savior.

I'd like to share a story, that I found in the book "*The One Year Great Songs of Faith*" connected with a hymn you may not know. It gives a slightly different view on how we can be transformed by our faith. The hymn "Lord, Kindly Light" by John Henry Newman, a 19th century leader in the Church of England, was written while on a return trip home from Italy. He had taken ill, was feeling great concern for the spiritual health of the Church of England, and the voyage had many challenges including fog and a lack of a strong wind. The captain pointed out to him that a single star shining at night is sufficient to navigate home. Newman later recalled the captain's reassurance that night and confessed he had been looking for God to transform things on that voyage by dazzling sunlight, when in turn God sent the light of one small kindly star, and this was more than enough to guide them home. This story can be a reminder to us that some will be transformed by Jesus by being illuminated on a mountain top, like Peter was, or instead some may be transformed by the light of one lone star.

All the Law and Prophets hang on these." What does Jesus' love look like in 2023? What does Jesus' love look like to the teenager, a Christian, a widower?

This idea is something I look forward to bringing to our EMERGE events as our high schoolers prepare for their Peace Camp and leadership positions, and as our Confirmation class continues their work in the "Welcome to America" project (details on page 8). Many thanks to all the families that made their pledges for 2023. Now comes the time to adjust your giving to your intended levels for 2023. For those of you donating by cash or check, just remember the new amount (along with the new year on your check) when you make the donation.

For those of you who use the online giving for recurring donations, please remember to log into the system and make any adjustments you need to make to reflect your intentions for 2023. You can visit PrinceofPeace.net and click on the E-giving link or just click on the link provided here. We also want to put in a plug for using the E giving system. You can use it for one-time donations or recurring donations and can donate to the general fund, the deaf ministry fund or make a "memorial gift." Just a little tip, the "memorial gift" option can be used for special donations such as special appeals or to the Pastor's charitable fund, just use the "note" field to specify.

Many have found the recurring gift option to be a time saving way to automate their regular giving, and we here in the stewardship group would like to encourage you to become a recurring gift giver to Prince of Peace.

It's important to note that giving and the Realm system will continue to be intertwined. Our 2023 pledge form was hosted by the new Realm database system this year and your donations are being tracked in the new system which will also be used to generate your giving statements. Realm also has an online giving platform which we will be migrating to in the coming months. Some of you might have encountered the form to make a donation since every so often a click on the link to the pledge form resulted in one being taken to the donation platform instead. There will be more information coming about the Realm database and giving through Realm at the appropriate time.

Then you will call, and the Lord will answer; you will cry for help, and He will say, "Here am I." - Isaiah 58:9a

The other day, I was home with great expectations of completing some items from my To Do list. There really wasn't a timeline when items had to be finished which allowed my procrastination to be in full force. I somehow imagined my list to deteriorate without me doing a thing. Anyway, I didn't feel right. I had no fever. Things in my stomach were remaining there. My aches and pains were no more than my usual amount. There was no major migraine pounding away. I just didn't feel right. I felt icky.

Bob laughed at my juvenile description of my body. He expected a slightly harder vocabulary word than icky. Did I want food? Did I need a wet washcloth? Should he get some cough syrup? The answer to all these kind requests was "no," I just felt icky. He was really concerned when I didn't even pick up my Kindle or phone instead choosing to just stare at the wall and "watch the paint." Bob is the kind of person who prefers to get out and get something done, even when a trip isn't necessary. He is the first to take a nap, but if he isn't sleeping, he needs to get up and at least get something to eat. I just wanted to lay quietly in the bed doing nothing.

I giggled at my grandson's descriptions of icky. (You did know I was a grandma, didn't you?) Teddy is a picky eater, so it was logical that many of the items that went in my husband's stomach were icky. (I agree!) Oliver first informed me that nothing was icky because they can always bring good things. Oops! He later slightly agreed with his mother's assessment that cold swimming pools are icky. (My Oliver is quite the swimmer training five nights per week.) He later reminded us that cold water made you swim faster to warm you up. Just keep moving. This fit his earlier lecture that things were not icky for long!

Some of you have lives that are currently icky. Things just aren't right. To complain about the situation is hardly worthwhile because it doesn't seem like anything is seriously wrong. You have no medical diagnosis that causes others to gasp in concern. Your family is doing fine so there are no sighs there. Your home is standing, slightly disheveled inside to say the least but nothing currently requiring a carpenter or plumber. Life is just icky. It is hard being a single parent with kids in and out of the house on a revolving door. The pile of bills is not going down at a particularly fast rate. You haven't talked to friends or family for quite some time, but they could call you for a change. Besides, you really aren't interested in hearing about their fabulous life without piles of laundry touching the ceiling. The job is a job, so you know you shouldn't complain. You feel almost guilty feeling icky when there are so many other people out there in worse predicaments. Yet life isn't good; it's icky.

All too frequently, we hear people comment that they don't need a Stephen Minister because things aren't that bad. There are so many people who need one far too much. You were fine. You needed to just stand up, put on that mask, and go on with your life. Things really are fine, yet you know deep down that isn't entirely true. You feel alone. You feel depressed. You feel forgotten. You feel stuck. You feel icky.

Let me be the first to proclaim that icky is a reason for getting a Stephen Minister, especially if you have been that way for any length of time. You can acquire a Stephen Minister for just a month or two. You can talk with your Stephen Minister on the phone instead of meeting somewhere. It's amazing how talking about the ickiness can make it go away more easily. Give one of us a call to talk more about it. Why not? It's free. It's confidential. It's done through caring members of our congregation. Let's together get rid of that ickiness. There are lots of better vocabulary words out there that would be perfect for you.

Welcome to America! Pack Project



PADS Update - February 2023

Prince of Peace will continue to provide healthy meal boxes to homeless guests housed in area hotels through the coming winter months. Look for sign up dates in the weekly emails sent out to the congregation.

Our church is still partnering with First Presbyterian of Arlington Heights, a Tuesday night PADS site. They will be offering a sign up online for kitchen and serving help, registration volunteers, first, second and third shift help and laundry and clean up assistance. There is flexibility in how often or how long a volunteer would want to serve, and seasoned volunteers will be on hand to help any new people learn about this vital ministry to the homeless.

All Saints Lutheran Church in Palatine has also reached out to us for volunteers. They are a Saturday night site which might make it easier for people to volunteer there instead of a weeknight.

Journeys also has a few unique volunteer opportunities at their new office in Palatine. They are looking for a bike repair volunteer to repair 1 - 4 bikes per shift in the repair room anytime between Monday - Friday, 8:30am to 4:00pm. People are needed to deliver prepared meals to clients staying in the hotel rooms from 6:00pm to 8:00pm Monday through Sunday. Volunteers are also needed for the food pantry and clothing closet at the Journeys office in Palatine. Since Prince of Peace did not open as a PADS site this season, these opportunities would be an effective way to continue supporting the homeless in our community.
