We are half-way through our 65th Anniversary year, which has given us unique opportunities to reflect on our history and celebrate with pictures and monthly gatherings. July is also a time when we reflect on our past fiscal year with an Annual Report from each board that includes more information about the impact of our ministries. Prince of Peace has a rich history, and we are blessed with incredible staff and dedicated volunteers that have kept our Congregation vibrant as shown by the highlights from each of our board reports. The Board of Communication has helped us grow our online ministry by obtaining and installing new camera equipment and training folks on how to use it. In addition, they've helped us share photos of our events as well as reach more people through social media posts. Each week they ensure our worship services are available on Facebook and YouTube.

The Board of Evangelism has been diligently reaching out to visitors and new members. Next year they will work closely with our newly formed Community Relations Committee to strengthen our connection with outside community groups. The Board of Fellowship has helped us move into our new normal by initiating our first post-Covid Lenten dinners and supporting our monthly anniversary celebrations as well as other special events.

The Board of Finance transitioned to new accounting software that is more cost effective and continues to help us find the best ways to make the most of our resources to support our ministries. The Board of Preschool onboarded a new director, Michelle Heberling. They've launched a new application that allows parents to communicate better with the Preschool staff and a new website highlighting our programs. The Board of Property was able to complete several projects from major repairs to our roof to replacing rain gutters, painting offices, and patching large potholes in the parking lot. We are grateful for their continued support and attention to our church home. The Board of Serving Ministries has continued to stay connected to our missionaries in Tanzania as well as work closely with all of our community partners to reduce food insecurity, the impacts of homelessness, and provide help to refugee families. The Board of Stewardship has provided us with new ideas to invest in God's mission by sharing stories of how our resources are used by our boards and creating education opportunities including one coming up on legacy giving. This will be happening in a couple of weeks. Contact the church office for more information.

The Board of Worship was thrilled to celebrate the 20-year anniversary of our Director of Music, Scott Uddenburg. They were also able to successfully navigate our weekly worship through evolving Covid-19 protocols with help from our Covid Task Force led by our Director of Discipleship, Karen Wagner. We are grateful to the task force and feeling very blessed that we are now able experience worship each week both in-person and online. The Board of Youth onboarded a new Director of Youth Ministries, Emily Uddenburg. Our youth took on an ambitious service project to collect enough items to furnish an apartment for a refugee family and were excited to discover they had enough items for two apartments!

We have celebrated many milestones over the past 65 years and look forward to many more. The words shared by Pastor E. Paape in 1966 at our building are as true today as they were back then "All this has been possible because God has been with us, leading and guiding. Today we give thanks for God's guidance and ask for God's continuing guidance for years to come. "

Board of Stewardship

So, it looks like the Director of the Board of Stewardship is in danger of losing the "Director" part of his title and just becoming the Board of Stewardship. I suppose I get it. I am pretty sure what first comes to mind about the work of the Board of Stewardship, when most people think about it at all, is asking people for money. I know I sure don't find that any fun (as testified to by the fact that my annual bicycle fundraiser ride is less than two weeks away and, as I sit here typing this, I still haven't asked more than a few people to donate money).

The Board of Stewardship is about more than just the annual Stewardship campaign though. We also coordinate the annual mission fair to highlight the work of all the boards at Prince of Peace and encourage members to contribute their time and talents to all the work that goes on at Prince of Peace. But those are just manifestations of the leading role of stewardship.

When I contemplate stewardship, what comes to mind is the parable of the talents in Matthew 24. In this parable, a master goes away and leaves three of his servants in charge of five, two and one talent of silver respectively according to their abilities. The two servants with five and two talents each earned five and two talents more while the master was away but the one with only one hid the talent away and gave it back when the master returned. The master commended the first two but dismissed the third.

In this passage, a talent is a unit of weight of about 75 pounds in units you are familiar with. However, it is interesting that our English word "talent" that we associate with abilities comes directly from this parable.

The definition of the English word "steward" is one who is entrusted with the care of someone else's property. Therefore, stewardship is the careful and productive management of something entrusted to one's care. The message I get from Matthew 24 is that God entrusts all of us with certain talents (both in the skills and abilities sense and in the monetary sense) and expects each of us to use those resources productively to give God a return on that investment. My view of the mission of the Board of Stewardship is to remind and encourage everyone to be good stewards of the resources entrusted to all of us. However, there is much more work to be done in this area than can be done by just one person. Surely there are others out there who feel a calling to be connected to this work. We all need you to fulfill your calling and step forward to get involved. Please email stewardship@princeofpeace.net for more information or to volunteer.

Our Faith Community Partnership with VHH

Our donations of bedding, bath, hygiene supplies, Aldo gift card, lamps, and sports equipment were gratefully received on May 25th. They made an immediate difference to one of the young men who was helping unload the

car—he was given one of the pillows, because he didn't have one yet. The thank you letter to the congregation stated, "Because of generous people like you, since opening in January 2017, more than 103 men from more than 25 nations have found success in school, work opportunities and relief from trauma, while building lives that will contribute to our nation."

VHH held an event titled "Viator Village Dinner" at Maggiano's on June 11^{th.} Two members of PoP attended with their spouses. It was a fundraiser and an inspiring celebration of the international, interfaith "village" of staff, volunteers and donors that surrounds the participants. It is that "village" that makes it possible for the young men to find hope, healing, and opportunity at Viator House. This congregation is part of that "village" -- as a faith community partner, we extend our mission to welcome the stranger.

Personal Stories

Two brothers from Venezuela were reunited at VHH recently. They hadn't seen each other in more than a year. The younger brother was already living at VHH when he got a call from his older brother, also an asylum seeker, who had been released from detention in Colorado and had a bus ticket to get to his court date in Chicago. He would have been homeless on arrival. VHH staff picked him up at the bus station and brought him to VHH, "where the brothers' long embrace emphasized the difference VHH makes." (From an emailed newsletter, with quote from Father Corey)

"Our names are Hematullah and Khalid. We are from Afghanistan. We moved into Viator House after coming to the U. S.... We were able to escape through the Kabul airport when the Taliban took over Afghanistan.

Since we moved in, we have had the opportunity to study English, start working and send money home to our families. If there is a word in our Pashto language that describes Viator House, it is "hom" which literally means "home," a place where you find love and people to stand with you in life." (a message printed for dinner attendees)

Ibrahima is from West Africa. When he entered the U.S., he applied for asylum in California. At the time, he was a minor, and was put in detention until he turned 18. He became a participant at VHH in December 2019. With the help of his case manager, he finished high school, got his driver's license, worked several jobs, and moved into an apartment; now he and his roommates are paying for rent, utilities, gas, and food. Ibrahima is proud to say that he pays income taxes! He is anxious to be given permanent residency and to become a U.S. citizen but is still waiting for a decision in the courts. His next hearing is in 2024.

He talked about his friend who had also fled from West Africa, and how he was excited to be reunited with his friend at VHH. He talked about his education during COVID-- when in-person classes were cancelled, he had to learn to use a computer because he needed to do his homework online.

Ibrahima thanked his tutors and the staff at VHH for helping him to achieve his successes. He is extremely fond of his case manager Marianne and thinks of her as his grandmother. (Ibrahima told his story at dinner; Marianne provided additional comments.)

At the conclusion of the dinner event, Father Corey said, "There's a corner of the world that is as God would have it. And that is Viator House." Mike works in the commercial (restaurant) equipment industry and Jennifer works for a vending company. If you are ever at the Menard's in Glendale Heights, visit Christopher who is the manager of the building department. All three of them are musically talented; Jennifer and Mike plan to join the adult choir and resume their hand bell careers, and Christopher plays the bass clarinet. (Scott, take note!)

Christine proudly shared that she was a board member at Prince of Peace when we became a reconciling in Christ church in the early nineties. She is so glad this is still an important mission for us today and for the future.

Christine retired as a speech and language pathologist and now enjoys time reading (and is a member of *many* book clubs, including at PoP!), activities with her senior group and, most importantly, time with family. Her four granddaughters are her pride and joy :-)

Rebekah Circle



Our selection for the Book Club for July is "And There was Light: Abraham Lincoln and the American Struggle" by Jon Meacham. We'll be meeting on July 28th at 10 AM in the CLC.

This book tells the story of Lincoln from his birth on the Kentucky frontier in 1809 to his leadership during the Civil War to his tragic assassination in 1865: his rise, his self-education, his loves, his bouts of depression, his political failures, his deepening faith, and his persistent conviction that slavery must end. In a nation shaped by the courage of the enslaved of the era and by the brave witness of Black Americans, Lincoln's story illustrates the ways and means of politics in a democracy, the roots and durability of racism, and the capacity of conscience to shape events.

PADS Update - July 2023

Journeys has informed all PADS faith partners that new funding has recently been granted to allow guests to remain in area hotels until October. Nearly 50 guests had to be relocated to a new hotel so as soon as they are settled, we will be starting up our bi-monthly food collection again, which is good news.

Journeys had a ribbon cutting ceremony for their new building on May 20th but are still awaiting occupancy permits to be able to house overnight guests on the second floor. This area will be used for overflow guests that cannot be accommodated in the PADS church sites. There are also several apartments for 90-day transitional housing that will be available to help families needing shelter. Volunteers will be needed in the fall to help with meals and other services.


