Coming this Fall:

Information about Proposed Constitution and Bylaw Amendments

Our Constitution/Bylaw Review Committee has been meeting since March. You may remember that in January 2023, this congregation voted to adopt the amendments to the ELCA Model Constitution for Congregations. Those amendments covered only parts of our Constitution that are required or recommended by the ELCA.

The Review Committee has been discussing other Constitution changes that need to be made to reflect our current procedures and practices, and to allow for flexibility. We've been focusing on the non-required sections of the Model Constitution. There are some recommendations for these sections from the ELCA, but congregations may omit these or choose alternative wordings.

We've also been focusing on our Bylaws, which have not been reviewed since 2015. They contain more details about how this congregation conducts its business. We are updating them as well, to reflect current needs, procedures, and practices.

The two documents together cover topics such as our Congregation Council, our elections, our congregation meetings, and responsibilities of our officers and committees, as well as processes used for the administration of Prince of Peace.

The Review Committee is working with the Congregation Council to finalize the proposed amendments for both the Constitution and the Bylaws. We expect to finish our work soon. Once the Council has approved the changes, look for more information from the Review Committee. We'll be sending emails and announcing information during services as we make plans for a special congregation meeting this Fall for the first vote on the Constitution amendments.

Pastor's Perspective

You may know by now that I'm not a particularly capable gardener. However, I love fresh tomatoes and basil (and mixed with a little mozzarella, it's my favorite meal!). Each year, I satisfy my desire to play in the dirt by growing cherry tomatoes and basil in pots. By September, these plants are nearing the end of their lifespan, and I get to play in the dirt a little while longer as I throw them into the compost pile. This is my little slice of agriculture, connecting me to creation in a powerful way. Because I "tend" these plants each day during the summer, I am aware when we experience drought or too much rain. This year's windstorms threatened the plants, although they were protected by the walls of my home. Each ripe tomato I pull from the vine feels like a victory, and I have favorite recipes for each variety of basil.



During the month of September, many organizations recognize Environmental Awareness Month. As Christian people, this recognition invites us to consider our part in God's creation and how our actions affect others. The Biblical story begins, "In the beginning, God created..." God created everything that we know and understand, as well as the vast aspects of space that we neither know nor understand. As God created, God proclaimed each thing good. Every Christian I have ever met agrees with this mythical understanding of the world around us. And yet...

Christians around the country are divided about whether our response to God's creation ought to be one of domination or stewardship. Did God give creation to humans to control and exploit, or did God offer humans the opportunity to create newness through gentle tending and care? Our church denomination has studied these questions carefully, and our understanding of God points to the clear answer that God asks humans to care for creation with gentleness and mercy. Jesus explicitly said, "love your neighbor as yourself," and neighbor-love demands earth-love. We see this through the storms that have raged around us this year, an El Nino weather pattern made worse by global climate change. Nearby, neighbors lost more than a few branches from tomato plants. Across the world, damaging floods, tornadoes, and hurricanes threaten livelihoods and lives. Caring for our neighbors means reaching out after these disasters, but it also means doing our part to limit the disasters where we can.

Even when we know this, though, it is difficult to know what to do, or when, or how. We have both too much and too little information. This month, I invite you to join me spiritually in one small action. One time each day, go outside to pray. Some days, this might be a short prayer in between the car and the door. Other days, you might take a prayer walk, allowing the things you notice to guide your conversation with God. You may choose to eat outdoors and say your meal prayer outside. You may step outside barefoot and let your prayer be connection to the dirt God made.

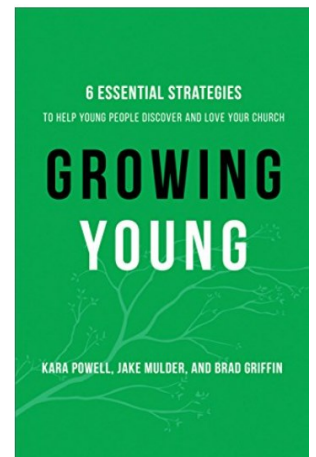
And then, tell the story. The good news (gospel) always starts with telling the story. Tell the story of who we are as Christians – those who follow Christ into the most dangerous circumstances with a message of love and grace for our neighbors and all of creation. Tell the story that our faith in this God who created us (and everything!) and called us good *also* calls us to gently tend each other (and everything!). Tell the story of your own experiences with creation – be they in planting or playing in the dirt or feeling the wind on your face. Tell the story of your outdoor prayers to a friend or neighbor, or to me. Then may our prayers and our stories lead us in Jesus' footsteps to care for our neighbors and all of creation.

Creating Strong Foundations for Our Youth

My brother, Bill, has five children and I have three. They range in age from 18 to 28. Our oldest kids are married, or soon will be, and we recently celebrated the birth of my brother's first grandchild. Our middle and youngest ones are moving through university studies and entering the professional world. We are so proud of all of them, but as many of you know being a parent of young adults is almost as busy and stressful as when they were toddlers and tweens. Bill and I recently talked about the fact that even though our youngest children are now legal adults they still need us more than ever. Sometimes it's just to ask what part of the envelope the postage stamp goes on or how to return an item purchased on Amazon. Other times it's to call because someone just hit the rear-end of their car and they need help with the police report or asking for time-tested ways to settle a newborn in the middle of the night. Through all of the issues both large and small it's amazing to see how our relationships continue to evolve.

It brings me back to two points that really stood out for me when we read the book *Growing Young: Six Essential Strategies to Help Young People Discover and Love Your Church*. These have put me in a better place to support the young folks in my own family and at Prince of Peace. The first point was why 25 is the new 15 and 15 is the new 25. That's proven to be very accurate in my family and likely in many of yours. When I think about my life at that age it was full of unknowns which were both exciting and terrifying at the same time. When I reflect on my mistakes and triumphs, I have so much empathy for the youth in our church and my own family. The other point was keychain leadership. This has been harder for me because it involves truly handing over the "keys". In my case those are the keys to the cars and the apartments, but also to the decision-making process about career choices including moving across an ocean to pursue those dreams.



Bill and I were both very fortunate to be able to raise our children in strong communities that provided our children with the foundation for successfully managing the challenges they face as young adults and managing the keys we are now handing over to them. Prince of Peace was instrumental in that process for my children and continues to be for many other families as well. This month our preschool, Emerge youth programs, and Sunday school classes are forming. It's exciting to see the many ways we continue to grow those ministries. Our youth are also getting more involved in church-wide serving opportunities such as collecting items and setting up two apartments for refugee families, providing music in our Sunday services, and helping to run the online streaming technical equipment. It's a good time of year to make sure we're continuing to revisit the insights from *Growing Young* and finding even more ways to support our youth and young families.



Music Notes...

My middle daughter Jennifer grew up here at Prince of Peace. She just graduated this year from Loyola University with a bachelors in history and global studies with a minor in anthropology. One of the challenges facing young people today is how to begin their post-graduate trek into adulthood. Many jump in to the workforce right away. Others decide to continue with their schooling. Still others take what some call a gap year where they try to find themselves and see the world! Jennifer was faced with such a choice when she finished school in January. As she explained in her Moment for Mission in worship on August 13th, she had a desire to find something that would allow her to travel and experience a new culture that would allow her to apply her majors. She also hoped to find something that would be anchored in and continue to challenge her faith life. What she found was an ELCA program called Young Adults in Global Mission. Quoting Jennifer's talk this program is, "A year of service inviting young adults to become the hands and feet of Jesus in the world, providing critical support to ministries and projects in communities of need. It also invites volunteers into a journey of self-reflection, providing space to consider their sense of identity, God's work in the world, and their place within it all."

Jennifer began her journey with YAGM back in March with an orientation week that took place in Woodstock, IL. This week-long orientation allowed Jenny to meet other participants of the program, interact with leadership, learn of the global partners, and explore her faith and how it may guide her toward success in the program. It was an encouraging first step, but just the start of her process. First, she was asked to think on which of the choice of programs might serve her best, while at the same time YAGM leadership would attempt to place Jenny in a spot that would serve everyone best. This would prove to be challenging. Multiple attempts were made over the course of the summer that ended in failure. One attempt the connecting church was not a good fit, and another securing a visa became an unsolvable problem. Doubt of Jennifer being able to go began to creep into all of our minds. However, God is in control, and just a few weeks ago we discovered that a placement had been found at a Baptist church in Stockton-on-Tees England, a good deal north of London and south of Edinburgh, Scotland. Jennifer was now faced with the prospect of moving quickly to get all the pieces in place for her to be ready to leave. By the time you read this Jenny will have gone through her orientation week here and have left for England. She will be in the U.K. for almost a year, not returning until late July next year. Her mom and dad needed to prepare to send their baby out into the world for such a long time, a difficult thing. 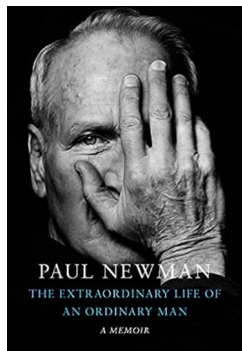
