# Pastor's Perspective

The Christian denomination of which Prince of Peace is a part (the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, or ELCA) is made up of congregations that have covenanted with (promised to) each other to journey together as communities of Christ. We use the word 'synod' to indicate groups of congregations that have committed to being together, generally because of their geographic location. In fact, the word synod derives from a Greek word that means "journey together." Each synod of the ELCA is paired with 2 companion synods – one domestic (another ELCA synod), and one global (another Lutheran church body in one of over 120 countries outside the US).

Prince of Peace is part of the Metropolitan Chicago Synod, and our international companion synod is the Central Diocese of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Southern Africa (ELCSA). As written in the covenant between these two synods, "The Companion Synod relationship exists for the purpose of strengthening one another for life and mission within the body of Christ. It offers us the privilege of participating in the life of another church through prayer, study, communication, and exchange of people and resources. It opens our eyes to the global challenge that Christ offers us today and calls us to deepen our commitment and discipleship as individuals and as a community of faith."

I am excited and grateful to share that I have been invited to accompany a team from our synod to visit our global companions in South Africa. Our group will leave on November 10 and return November 21. During this time, I look forward to learning much from our siblings in Christ. Each synod will share our triumphs, struggles, and hopes. More importantly, though, we will build relationships that – God willing – will outlast our time together. I look forward to sharing about these new friends and all kinds of things I have learned from this experience when I return. While I will have some opportunities to share on Sunday mornings and in Tidings, please ask if you're interested in hearing more (or seeing pictures)!

I will return the day before our Interfaith Thanksgiving service, and the Sunday following will be Christ the King Sunday. These services of gratitude and hope for the future remind us that we are all children of God, and the future belongs not to frail humans but to God. In this spirit, we know we are connected to all of God's children - Lutherans, Christians, people of all (and no) faiths. May we journey together in joy, gratitude, and hope.

# Loving Our Neighbors

Jesus instructed his disciples that there are but 2 commandments - to love God, and to love our neighbors as ourselves (Matt 22:37-39). These commandments are not easy, but when we take them seriously, they frame our relationships in helpful ways.

October 11 is the annual National Coming Out Day. The date was selected in 1988 because it was the second anniversary of the National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights in 1987. It was founded by Robert Eichberg, who was a psychologist from New Mexico and the founder of the personal growth workshop "The Experience" and Jean O'Leary, who was an openly lesbian political leader and long-time activist from New York and was at the time the head of the National Gay Rights Advocates in Los Angeles.

The purpose behind starting National Coming Out Day was to provide a different type of response to anti-LGBT actions. They wanted a way to maintain positivity and celebrate coming out. These conversations can be very stressful because it's tough to know how someone else may respond when they find out a person self-identifies as part of the LGBTQ+ community.

I began having these conversations 14 years ago after falling in love with the woman who is now my wife. My first conversation was with my mom. It didn't go well. The conversation with my brother and sister-in-law was much better and they have remained my most steadfast allies. Eventually they helped my mom and me heal our relationship. Even though many years have gone by since my first conversations, I continue to find myself in similar conversations. They never get easier, but I have found more helpful and positive ways to manage these encounters over the years.

My faith plays a large role in celebrating my authentic self and feeling positive about coming out conversations. It is especially comforting when I find myself in conversations with folks who tell me they struggle with reconciling their faith while supporting me and the LGBTQ+ community. I usually share with them that I lean on the fact that God created each of us and loves all of us. God simply asks that we love ourselves and one another whether we understand everything about another person's situation or not. God gives us grace to know we are loved as we are regardless of how others perceive us and regardless of if that perception is popular or not. In GALATIANS 3:28-29 it says: *"And we no longer see each other in our former state—Jew or non-Jew, rich or poor, male or female—because we're all one through our union with Jesus Christ with no distinction between us."*

While my faith is sustaining and comforting to me, I've also learned I'm not the only one who ends up in these conversations. My most steadfast allies end up having them too. It's not possible for my children, family, and friends to always avoid awkward conversations that lead them into their own version of a coming out conversation on my behalf. This is also true for organizations I belong to. The conversations can feel uncomfortable, but there is power in sharing our stories.

As Robert Eichberg pointed out in 1993: "Most people think they don't know anyone gay or lesbian, and in fact, everybody does. It is imperative that we come out and let people know who we are and disabuse them of their fears and stereotypes."





## *Music Notes...*

Hi everybody,

Grab a cup of tea, coffee or other beverage, we are going to have a rap session this month about our organ. Many of you have questions about the need to spend money on its repair. You've heard it needs replacing but in worship lately it sounds fine to you. As of this writing, the organ has been performing as it should (knock on wood now). However, this time last year before Christmas a major part of the pipe portion failed which caused a tremendous cypher. Cyphers occur in pipe organs when air moves into the pipes without pressing on a key to play the pipe and instead makes a continuous sound. Most times a cypher is a single pipe, in our case it was ALL of them! Upon investigation, we discovered a sizable number of other things not working on the organ console which plays the pipes and is the centerpiece of the electronic portion of the instrument.

Our organ is a hybrid instrument: it's half pipes, half electronic. The electronic side is really a computer. With the growth of digital instruments in the '80's, a new type of organ started to be built using sampled sounds, basically recordings of real instruments that were configured to be played by electronic instruments. Casio keyboards became popular and are an example using sampled sounds. In time, this technology was applied to organs. Pipe organs were beginning to get expensive to maintain so sampled electronic instruments gave the sound without the expense. It was a solution for those who wanted a pipe organ but did not have the money to fix or replace instruments. However, not everyone liked the sound of the electronic organs. By the early '90's a type of instrument was developed made of both the new technology and pipes. Prince of Peace purchased a state-of-the-art type of this new instrument. Steve Smith, who was organist here, and Gary Howard, a member of the congregation, helped create the vision of our current organ and completed the project. Steve still works with the company that installed our organ. That brings us to today.

Nothing on the organ console has been upgraded since installation over 30 years ago. We've done upkeep on it, but how many of you are using a device from the early 90's today? Not many devices from that era are still functioning. That is what needs to be replaced. Chips that have failed on the organ cannot be replaced and new ones aren't made anymore. Currently when Collin is playing, he just doesn't use those stops or sounds on the instrument. It hampers his choices in how the instrument sounds including dynamics. Consider driving an automobile without cruise control, A/C and speedometer on a 30 year old top-of-the-line car because you can't find replacements for the failed parts. The car runs, but not the way it was designed to. Some people would keep that car, but most would replace it with one that will fully function or one even better. The good news is that we can still work with Steve Smith. The pipes of the organ have been maintained, work great and can be integrated with a new console which would upgrade the instrument with the new technology and make it better than before. We still run a chance that we arrive one morning and the organ no longer works. We can't use our existing pipes without a console, so now is the time to consider funding the new console.

Some folks have already made a financial contribution for the new console. We have to have the money before we make a purchase order. I'm waiting to receive the final price for purchase and installation; the cost will be over \$100,000. The organ is a legacy instrument for the congregation. We have had many fine musicians play our organ, and if we purchase a new console, we will invite a number of those fine musicians back to play! If you have any further questions about maintaining the legacy of fine organ music at Prince of Peace, please feel free to speak to me.

## Board of Stewardship

Fall is in the air. This weekend as I was cutting my lawn that had grown quite a bit in only one week, I was thinking that in only about a month I will be cleaning up my mower to put it away for the season and will be raking leaves. That can mean only one thing, it is time for the annual stewardship emphasis.

For me (and I hope many of you), this means this is the time of the year when I take the time to reflect on all the gifts God has shared with me during the year, what God is doing through my congregation and to pray about the portion of those gifts I have received that God wants me to use to support the work of Prince of Peace. Maybe that is why we put these asks in the national season of Thanksgiving.

However, I will note that even I think annual stewardship asks are losing some of their importance. Over the last few years, the number and amount of pledges has dropped off significantly while the actual donations have declined much less. We are not alone in this phenomenon as data presented at the Kaleidoscope stewardship conference I attended showed. Therefore, the Stewardship committee has decided to compress the annual emphasis to one week but to expand stewardship messaging to a year-round process to encourage everyone to keep gratitude to God for the gifts one has been given in one's mind more often than once a year.

There is still a value in putting your promise down in writing as in a pledge. Psychologists say that people are more likely to stay committed to a goal if they put the goal in writing. Furthermore, a pledge to the church is itself a form of worship that many of us value in our spiritual journey. Not only are we not thinking about abandoning taking pledges but I am encouraging those who are hesitant to make one to re-think not making one. The promise is mostly between you and God. While a few staff and volunteers (and you) can see your progress towards fulfilling your pledge in Realm, no one will challenge you if you are not fulfilling your pledge (although if a giving pattern indicates a concern about one's spiritual health one might get some appropriate pastoral care).


## Photo Directories


## Schaumburg Township Food Pantry Items Needed
